The ASP Ad Hoc Committee on Disciplinary Representation and Interdisciplinary Activities met on September 21 in St. Louis, MO. Under the

able chairmanship of Doree Fragaszy, the committee spent the day discussing the relation of the ASP to the larger community of individuals working with nonhuman primates in research, both in the field and in captivity. The recommendations of the committee are now being considered by the ASP Board of Directors and, when instituted, will, I believe, bring the society closer to the founders' goal of fostering communication among individuals from diverse scientific disciplines who share a common interest in and passion for nonhuman primates.

The committee agreed upon the following definition of interdisciplinary: an integrative research program that incorporates more than one level of analysis, more than one method of analysis, and more than one area of expertise. Based upon that definition, the following list offers a preview of the flavor of the

The ASP Ad action items recommended by the Hoc Committee to foster interdisciplinary tee on Disciactivities:

- ➤ Give priority to interdisciplinary symposia in upcoming annual meeting programs wherein this can be a centerpiece with no other competing talks, with such a symposium either drawn from submitted abstracts or by specific invitation from a symposium organizer
- Develop a symposium on field research - biomedical research interface, with the work of J. Phillip-Conroy being given as an example
- ➤ Have structured, professional discussions at the annual meeting about research ethics, with the topic and organization of the discussion handled by an ASP Research Ethics Committee
- Have fewer concurrent oral sessions and more posters and provide session chairs a form to track attendance in sessions.
- Vary timing to include more field scientists – e.g. fall meetings and evaluate success by attendance and type of presentations

The scientific meeting will begin at 8:00 a.m. on Thursday, June 19 and the meeting will close with the traditional banquet on Saturday evening, June 21. The banquet will be held at the Palm Beach Zoo.

Applications will be accepted beginning 1 January, 2008 and are due 31 January, 2008.

Primatology Film Competition at the 2008 International Primatological Society XXII Congress

A Primatology Film Competition is to be held to judge the best films/videos made in the area of primatology produced from 1997 up to present. The winning productions will be screened at the meeting of the International Primatological Society in Edinburgh, Scotland, August 3-8, 2008; the last such competition held screenings at the 1996 IPS Congress in Madison, Wisconsin.

There will be two categories:

- (1) professionally made (e.g. commercial or public television company productions with budget above \$30,000),
- (2) non-professional, independent production with cost of production under \$30,000.

Monetary prizes will be awarded to the top entries in the non-professional category, and appropriate certificates from the IPS will be awarded to the winners in the professional category. An entry fee of \$35 for non-professional entries and \$75 for professional entries is required (these fees will go towards prizes and miscellaneous expenses). This program is endorsed by IPS.

The deadline for receiving entries is January 31, 2008.

ASP 2008 CALL FOR ABSTRACTS

The Program Committee invites you to submit your best scientific work in any area of primatology for inclusion in the 2008 program. Papers and posters presented at annual meetings of the ASP are to be based on high quality research that has generated interesting data relevant to current scientific issues in primatology. Abstracts of these presentations are published in the *American Journal of Primatology*. Abstracts will undergo peer-review by the Program Committee and submitting authors will be notified by email of the status of the abstract. Accepted abstracts will be organized into sessions based on topic area and type of presentation. Abstracts may be submitted electronically or mailed to the Chair of the Program Committee.

Detailed requirements for writing and submitting abstracts are available at

http://www.asp.org/asp2008/AbstractRquirements.html. Questions about the program should be directed to Matthew Novak, Chair of the Program Committee.. In addition to being published in the *American Journal of Primatology*, abstracts will be available for viewing on-line at least two weeks before the meeting begins.

ASP has converted to a primarily on-line abstract submission and registration process. You will not receive a packet in the mail. Information about the meeting venue, requirement for abstract preparation, presentation guidelines, and instructions for students who wish to apply for poster and paper awards are all available at the ASP website (http://www.asp.org/asp2008/index.htm).

Submission of an abstract implies that one of the authors will attend the meeting and present the work described in the abstract. Individuals are limited to giving two presentations, whether two oral presentations, two posters, or one of each format, but may appear as a co-author on other abstracts as well.

Submission of an abstract implies that the authors have complied with current legal and ethical guidelines regarding the use and well-being of nonhuman primates. The submitting author's signature in Part 3 of the "Presentation Information Form" acknowledges that each author of the submitted abstract has seen and approved the final version of the abstract, and has given consent to appear as an author.

STUDENT TRAVEL AWARDS

Student travel awards are available from ASP this year. These awards take 2 forms:

- 1. All active students are eligible for \$500.00 awards to offset the cost of travel, and accommodation for the 2008 meeting courtesy of the ASP student travel fund supported by donations to the society in the memory of Gerald C. Ruppenthal. Additional funding for these awards is provided by Carter² Systems Inc. Carter² Systems Inc. donates \$5.00 for every "Rupe"rch (Gerry's last invention) they sell during the year to the student travel fund.
- 2. Watts Student Travel Awards in the same amount are available to students specifically from Mexico and other Caribbean and South or Central American countries.

The awards are designed to help student who would otherwise not be able to attend the meeting.

Award Criteria:

- 1. Undergraduate and graduate students are eligible. Students must be presenting work as a first author.
- 2. Each applicant must be currently enrolled as a bona fide student and be a member of ASP.

To apply:

1. Email Matthew Novak of your intent to apply for funds (novakm@mail.nih.gov). Specifically identify whether you are applying for the Watts Student Travel Award or the Ruppenthal Student Travel Award.

For the Ruppenthal Award, you will then be asked to:

- 1. Submit a photocopy of BOTH SIDES of your current student ID.
- 2. Submit a letter of recommendation from you research advisor or laboratory director which addresses the level of independence of the student's contribution to their ASP presentation.



3. Submit a current CV and a copy of your abstract identical to that submitted on line for the conference (send to Matthew Novak electronically as an attachment).

Complete materials and abstract must be received by the abstract due date: January 14, 2008. The Board of Directors has established ad hoc committees consisting of members-at large, members of the local arrangements committees, members of the BOD to decide on recipients for both awards. If you apply and do not win an award and this prevents you from traveling to and participating in the 2008 conference then ASP will refund your registration fees.

Abstract Deadline

January 14, 2008: Deadline to submit on-line or mail-in abstracts. You cannot renew your society membership and register for the meeting on the same day. If you are renewing your membership, please allow 5 days for credit card renewals and 10 days for check renewals before you register for the meeting. You can renew online at www.asp.org. Gibbon Conservation Center *Position Description:* Animal care (feeding captive gibbons, preparing their food, changing water, cleaning enclosures, observation) and maintenance of the facilities and grounds. Depending on the time of the year, work is 10-12 hours per day beginning in early morning, 7 days per week. May also include clerical and computer work.
